Since Grandfather had broken a dish or two, his food was served in a wooden bowl. When the family glanced in Grandfather's direction, sometimes he had a tear in his eye as he sat alone. One evening before supper, the father noticed his son playing with wood scraps on the floor. He asked the child sweetly, "What are you making?" Work Out Your Own Salvation

Philippians 2:12 says, "... work out your own salvation with fear and trembling." What is this passage saying? Is it saying there are many ways to be saved, and people can be saved by whatever method they choose? This is not the meaning of this passage as such a view would contradict other clear passages found in the Scriptures.
